The other portions of the mesorands, which deal with alleged violations of the Sational Prohibition Act I across you will give oppropriate attention.

Memorandum: Synopsis of my charges against Vajor W.L.Ray, Gpecial Agent in Charge of Detroit Unit.and against Colonel George Wayo. Assitent Opecial Agent in Charge of Detroit Special Agents office.

I will state in this memorandum a brief summart of my charges against the above named Prohibition officials. I obtained this information while employed by a private detective agency in Detroit, and concurrently doing under-cover investigative work for Major Ray. A full record of my connection with Major Ray is in the Prohibition files. This occured in the spring of 1929.

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- Abraham J. Moss and Isidore Sweetwine. These men were well known rackteers, Moss being the chasfof the so-celled \$10,000,000 international smuggling syndicate. He is known to have conducted extensive operations in dope, slien and liquor smuggling. Mr. Sweetwine was a pattner in the Moss syndicate There was been many indictments against these men and their gang. Not only did Colonel Mayo make out their tax reports but he gave themsepert assistence in evading the payment of their correct tax dues. He repented Abe Moss as a matter of fact his commissions on Canadian liquor was over \$10,00.6 The Canadian export records will confarm this statement.
- 2. Colonel Mayo kept the Moss gang informed of the activities of the federal enforcement units on the Canadian border, and was a frequent visitor at the gang headquarters at Windsor, Ont.
- of the Special Agents, he used ty services for about three months on investigations of the Moss gang Furple gang Moran and Espone units which were operating in Detroit. He obtained detailed information of the big-scale operations of wholesale bootlegging organizations. He never made any arrests or raids on these violators, except in the case of the Furple gang. But if I remember correctly no convections were ever obtained sgainst them.
- 4. During this time I worked as a "go-between" for Major Ray and Abe Moss, chief of a powerful ring of smugglers, and I negotiated a conference between them. Major Ray offered to assist Moss in fixing the district Attorney so certain Moss gangsters could return to the United States and pay small, nominal fines. About twenty of themwere under indictment and had fled to Canada. Major R sy was to receive \$1,000 for every Moss man he "sprung" from the syndicate.
- 5. Also, I helped Major Ray obtains detailed information on the operations of the American Motorized Transport co. Inc. a rackteer organization owned by Bugs Moran and Ted Newberry, well known Chicago bootleggers. He never did make arrest of these villators, even the he knew they transported thousands of cases of liquor between Detroit and Thicago.

Mr. Purvis said he had some dope that you will probably want to make notes Man named Arthur G.C. andler, 1414 Winnebach Avenue, telephone number Edgewater 3931, Chicago, now employed by Mickleberry's Sausage Company, formerly employed by Ford Motor Company, Detroit, as investigator under Harry Bennett at the office of the Highland Park plant in Detroit; was laid off because he secured some information about high officials of the Ford Company; that is He showed us in the paper concerning this Lindwhat he tells Mr. Purvis. bergh kidnaping that the name of the nurse was Betty Gow and he knows that a man named Scotty, Gow who is a member of the Purple Gang of Kidnapers - he knows that Betty Gow is a sister of Scotty Gow and he gave us a description of the Betty Gow that he knows; age 28, height 5' 42"; weight 120 pounds; complexion medium; eyes and hair unknown; occupation is private nurse. Chandler says he saw this Betty in Scotty's house when he went there in Detroit to recover the possession of property which had been in the possession of Scotty / year and a half ego; this property had been stolen from commissary of the Highland Park Ford Motor Company Plant and the only associates of Scotty Gow known to Chandler are Fitzpatrick, whose father is a Captain in the Palmer Park Police at Detroit and a man named Tirpo, another Detroit hoodlum. Tr. Purvis said that was all he had so far and he thought possibly that might be of value.

Memorandum re telephone call to Colonel Schwartzkopf.

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Mr. Hoover said he wanted to give the following information. The Bureau's Chicago office called by long distance concerning the nurse at the Lindbergh house; they located in Chicago this morning a man who, having read the name in the paper of the nurse as Betty Kow, stated that he knows that Scotty Kow, who is a member of thexturple Gang of Kidnappers at Detroit, has a sister by the name of Betty Gow who is a nurse - the Purple Gang is a falmous gang which has been inculging in kidnappings in the Middle West - the description given of the sister is 28 years of age; height 5' 42" inches; weight 120 pounds; complexion medium; occupation, private nurse. The man in Chicago who gave information stated he had seen Betty Gow in her brother's home in Detroit about a year and a half ago and the brother at that time, together with this man in Chicago who gave this information this morning was interested in some stolen property which had been stolen from the Ford Motor Company; of course, he does not know whether the girl at the Lindbergh house is this girl but he felt in view of the fact that he had heard the name and met this girl and she was a nurse that he had better give the information. Mr. Hoover said he wanted to pass it on.

Colonel Schwartzkopf inquired as to the hair. Hr. Hoover said No, eyes and hair unknown, he was unable to recall what color eyes or hair she had. Mr. Hoov r soid he wanted to pass this on in the event the authorities had not gotten it. Colonel Schwartzkopf said he had not received it. Mr. Hoover said this Purple Gang is a very notorious gang at Detroit and this man Scotty -Colonel Schwartzhopf inquired if the Bureau had any information as to its methods of working. Mr. Hoover said we had never heard before that they indulged in kidnaping babies, they have usually taken racketeers and gangsters and held them for ransom and when it is produced the generally set them loose. Mr. Hoover said it is a very bad notorious group. This man who gave us this information is employed in Chicago at the present time and was at one time working for the Ford Motor Company in Detroit and that is how he came to-know this group. Mr. Hoover said if we got anything more he would call and pass it on.

The Colonel thanked Mr. Hoover and was told by Mr. Hoover that if there was any other service the Bureau could be to him to just call Mr. Hoover.

Memorandum re telephone call to Mr. Reinecke.

ar. Hoover said that he understood from Mr. Purvis at Chicago - in regard to this Lindbergh kidnaping case - that a man who belongs to the Purple Gang in Detroit named Gow - Scotty Gow is his name - supposed to have resided at various times in Detroit and has a sister by the name of BettylGow who is presumably a nurse in the Lindbergh home, at least that is the mame of the nurse. Mr. Hoover said he had communicated this information to Col. Schwartzkopf who is commanding the State Police; it is not known whether Gow girl in Lindbergh home is the same one, but the information from Chicago is that Scotty Gow has been a member of the Purple Gang for a long time and his sister is about 28 years of age; 5' $4\frac{1}{2}$ " in height; weighs 120 pounds; medium complexion and her occupation is that of a private nurse and it kind of fits in to the picture of the girl at the Lindbergh home. This information given to us by a man named Arthur Candler, who is working in Chicago at present, but at one time was employed as an investigator by the Henry Ford Motor Company at Detroit working under a man by the name of Harry/Bennett -Mr. Reinecke said he knew him and that he was Chief of Police of the Ford Company - and Mr. Hoover asked Mr. Reinecke to find out about Candler from Bennett if he could, we want to handle this matter very confidentially, don't give out any information on it but we want to get a line as to who Candler to and his make-up. Candler claims he was fired by the Ford Company because he obtained some information about the Ford Company and was also a friend of Gow and about $1\frac{1}{2}$ years ago when he was in Detroit he went to see Gow to endeavor to recover some property which had been in the possession of Gow which had been stolen from the commissary of the Highland Park Ford Company plant and either the Purple Gang had done it or Candler had been mixed up in it, it is not very clear; while in Gow's house Betty Gow came in and he saw her, that is where he got her description.

Er. Hoover said he would like to get a line on Scotty Gow, who he is and anything about him you can find out; also anything you can find out about Candler. Ar. Hoover said the only associates of Scotty Gow known to Candler was a man by the name of Fitzpatrick, whose father is Captain in the Palmer Park Police - Mr. Reinecke said probably Palmer Park Police Precinct - and a man named Firpo who is also a Detroit policeman. Ar. Hoover said it might be a wild sort of lead. The N. J. Police Commander has been advised so he can check up on it at the Lindbergh home. Find out all you can about Scotty Gow and anything on the Sister and ask Bennett, if he is reliable, to find out what he knows about Candler.

Ex. Reinecke said that last summer he made the acquaintance of a pretty good informant in the underworld who is pretty well acquainted with the Purple Gang and inquired if he should take him into his confidence, that is so far as to question him about Scotty Gow. Mr. Hoover said he thought he would that he thought it would be perfectly O. K.; to be very careful and would do it not indicating along the Lindbergh case but indicating as to some other interest we may have, and then let me know by wire or long distance what you get.

Memorandum re telephone call to Col. Schwartzkopf.

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mr. Hoover called regarding the Gow matter and come others.

Check at Detroit developed that original informant was investigator in Detroit and his reputation is good for integrity and veracity; Scotty Dow, according to information in Detroit, is now in Scotland and according to Detroit information was not at any time arrested nor to their knowledge ever connected with the Purple Gang; nor did he have a sister but his wife had a sister by the name of Betty Burrel. After getting that the informant in Chicago was confronted with this information and he stated he still maintains that the woman whom he saw in Scotty Gow's home was Scotty Gow's sister because he was introduced to her by Scotty Gow's wife — as Betty Gow and also claims that he knows that Scotty Gow was tied in with the Purple Gang and was acting more or less as a fence for stolen property in Detroit.


Mr. Hoover asked if the Colonel had a photograph of the nurse in the Lindbergh home and whether he could send it on so the Bureau could send it to Chicago in order to see if the man could identify the picture. The Colonel said he could do that.

Another angle is this. There resides in Washington a family named Suter, they are the parents of AnnySuter, an actress, who is rather well known actress has been playing on Broadway at times and is at present in England; sometime ago she got into the hands of some blackmailers and among the blackmailers was a man named Mangel, the same name of the man who claims to own the car you found there in Jersey; the significant thing about it is that the papers down here printed the ransom note and the Suters had some papers in their possession from a man whom this ann Suter knew, a steward on the boat coming over from Europe with her and with whom she became involved and who introduced her later to these blackmailers among whom was Mandel; the printing on the photograph of millar which they have corresponds in some degree to the printing on one of these ransom notes, the one that was mailed from Newark that said "baby safe"; one of the Government experts has examined the newspaper reproduction and the original which the Suters gave the Bureau and there is some marked similarity Mr. Hoover asked if the N. J. found and he also found some differences. authorities had photographic copy of the note that was mailed from Newark as it would be better for the expert to look that over. No photographs have been taken of that. The Colonel asked if a photostatic copy would be sent of what the Bureau had.

DEFINENT OF JUSTICE

With reference to my telephone conversations with you on today and yesterday, concerning the kidnapping of Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr., please be advised that Mr. Arthur G. Candler, 1414 Winnemac Avenue, Chicago, Illinois, telephone Edgewater 3931, called at this office on March 3, 1932, and stated that he had some information which might possibly be of some assistance in the apprehension of the kidnappers.

Mr. Candler was interviewed by Special Agent E. P. Guinane, and he furnished the following information:

Mr. Candler related that up to about one and one-half years ago he was employed as an investigator for the Ford Motor Company in Detroit, Michigan, with offices at the Highland Park Plant, working under the direction of Mr. Harry Bennett: that he noticed in the newspaper accounts of the kidnapping of Charles Lindbergh, Jr. that the name of the nurse for the Lindbergh baby was Betty Cow. He stated that he recognized this name immediately as being the same name of a party involved in a case which he had handled at Detroit, Michigan, while employed by the Ford Motor Company. In this connection, he stated that approximately one and one-half years ago, he had traced some merchandise which had been stolen from the Ford Commissary at the Highland Park branch of the Ford Motor Company to the possession of one ScottyXCow; that he called at the home of Scotty Gow, which was located in Royal Oak, Michigan, a suburb of Detroit, and while at this home, he saw a sister of Scotty Gow's, whose name was Betty Gow; he further stated that this Betty Cow was a private nurse but at that time was out of employment. He further stated that Scotty Gow's wife was in the house at the time that he saw Betty Gow.

Mr. Candler described Betty Gow as follows:

Age - 28 yrs.

Height - 5'4½"

Weight - 120 lbs.

Complexion - Medium

Eyes - Color unknown

Hair - Color unknown

Occupation - Frivate nurse, out of employment at that time.

Mr. Candler further stated that the only associates of Scotty Gow at that time that he knows of were Fitzpatrick (first name unknown), whose father was Captain of the Palmer Park Police Station in Detroit, Michigan, and Firpo (first name unknown).

Mr. Candler stated that Scotty Gow was a member of the famous Purple Gang which terrorized Detroit several years, and that he thought there might be a possibility that Betty Gow, sister of Scotty Gow, is the nurse for the Lindbergh baby, and if so, there is some possibility that Scotty Gow and some of his associates might have some connection with the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby.

Mr. Candler stated that his connections with the Ford Motor Company were severed about one and one-half years ago, because he had secured some important information involving some high officials of the Ford Company, and that he "knew too much" and his services were therefore discontinued.

Mr. Candler stated that he had just made connections with the Mickelberry Food Products Company, and that he was to leave in the next day or so one selling trip into Northern Michigan.

Mr. Candler stated that he did not believe that Scotty Cow was prosecuted for stealing the merchandise in the case which he investigated. He stated that he merely obtained information on the case and then turned whatever information he had obtained over to Mr. Bennett, head investigator of the Ford Motor Company, and that generally no one would know what disposition was made, as the Ford Motor Company would take its own action. Mr. Candler further stated that it may be possible that there was no criminal prosecution in this case for the further reason that Fitzpatrick, who was also involved with Gow, was the son of a police captain. He further stated

that Scotty Gow had been an employee of the Ford Motor Company at the Highland Park plant, and had worked in the Commissary Department, and that by reason of his connections in the Commissary, he obtained copper fittings and other material made of copper, and turned these materials over to the members of the Purple Gang.

Subsequent to my telephone conversation with you yesterday I arranged to have Kr. Candler again call at this office, and he did so late yesterday afternoon, and furnished the following information:

Betty Gow was in Detroit between eighteen and twenty months ago, looking for work. Mr. Candler has never seen her before or since that time. The manner in which Mr. Candler learned that Betty Gow was Scotty Gow's sister, is that at the time when Candler went to Scotty Gow's house, Mrs. Gow, the wife of Scotty, said "I hope there is nothing wrong with Scotty. We are having lots of trouble now. He has been pretty sick lately, and we've got his sister here with us now." Candler saw the girl who was designated as Betty, and asked her how she liked Detroit. She stated she didn't like it at all. Candler is unable to remember where Betty said she was from. He cannot be sure whether it was from Scotland or Ireland, but she gave him the impression that she was from one of these countries, or from a small town, due to the fact that she was not apparently a wide awake or flapper type of girl. She did not have a "city" appearance about her.

In addition to the description above given, Mr. Candler stated that he could not definitely state the color of Betty Gow's hair, adding that it was not black, and neither was it blond. It was not of a striking color either way, although it might have been dark brown. He did not state as to the color of her eyes. She was of medium build, and he thinks she did not wear glasses.

A description of Scotty Gow is as follows: Dark, curly hair, sharp face, shrewd eyes, color unknown, height 5'7" or 8", weight between 140 and 145 pounds, clean shaven. His actions are quick and nervous. Candler's impression is that Scotty Gow's eyes are very dark, but cannot say definitely. He always keeps his eyes squinted. Scotty Gow usually carries a Parker pen and pencil set in his pocket, and is supposed to be an insurance salesman. He is said to be between the ages of 33 and 35 years. He has a nice appearance, and a dark complexion.

Mr. Candler's story is that he was employed by the Ford Motor Company in the Service Department, which is really the Secret Service of Police Department of the Ford Motor Company, and that he usually worked alone, whereas most of the other men worked in pairs. For about two years a graft had been practiced on the Ford Motor Company, at its Commissary on Manchester and Woodward Avenues, Detroit, and the officials, of course, wanted it stopped. In line with his general duties, Er. Candler had been instructed to look out for Scotty Gow Fitzpatrick, and Firpo, or any of the Furple Gang, several of whom had been pointed out to him. It might be stated here that Scotty Gow is said to have been previously employed in the Ford plant, and to have occupied the position which Candler occupied. Gow being the predecessor of Candler. In his official duties in the Service Department, sixty men were employed under him. Candler, and Gow. Gow's hours of duty were from four p.m. to twelve midnight.

In order to expedite this matter the statement of Cendler was taken down as he gave it, and although it is not in statement form, or signed, it is quoted herewith. It will be noted that it possibly contains some irrelevant detail, but as a whole it gives all the information furnished by him.

"One evening I was sitting down in the office and a clerk came down and told me Scotty Gow and Fitzpatrick were in the plant, so I told this man to let me know when they left the plant. As they left I watched them through the window and saw them carry four shopping bags full of merchandise and put them in an olive green Essex sedan. I left the office, crossed the street toward the sedan, and Fitzpatrick got out and ran down the alley. I met Scotty Gow as he got out of the car. I asked him to open up the car and show me what he had in it. He said the doors were locked and he couldn't, so I opened the doors and dumped out the shopping bags, which were full of silk hosiery, ladies' underwear, exfords, pen and pencil sets, etc. I asked Scotty Gow to bring these things back and put them on my desk in the office which he said he would do as long as no one saw him do it. I left the office so he could come in without anyone seeing him, and called up the boss and told him what had happened. He did not return the goods at the time he said he would, so I got in a car and went to a house on LaBelle Street in Detroit.

I found his car parked in front of a two story frame building. I looked through the window and saw him sitting downstairs with Fitzpatrick and two girls. The lights went out downstairs, lights went on upstairs. I waited three hours and finally he came out. I stopped both of them and told them they would be arrested; that I was going to take them to the station. They said "Don't do that, we'll bring the goods back. We've given half of it to the girls in there." They went in and took the lingerie, exfords, and hosiery away from the girls. The rest of the goods was still in the car. They brought back this merchandise to the plant, and left it on my desk. I called up the boss and told him what had happened and he said "Go out and get the rest they have been taking for the past year."

"They refused to have anything more to do with me, but said if they would send another man over they would give him as much of the merchandise as they could possibly get back. The other fellow went over and got another sedan load of fountain pen sets, lingerie, silks, oxfords and shoes, etc. The next evening this other man asked me to go with him to Scotty Gow's house. I went over to Scotty Gow's house in Royal Cak, Michigan, a town adjacent to Detroit. We went in the front way. His wife and another girl who turned out to be Scotty Gow's sister were sitting in the dining room. Scotty Gow was supposedly in bed, sick. We went into the bedroom to find out how much other merchandise Scotty Gow had, but before going into the bedroom this other man went in and asked me to sit out there for awhile till he talked to Scotty Gow. man's name is Vaness. While sitting in the dining room I asked Mrs. Gow how everything was, and she gave me the answer set out above.

"When Scotty Gow worked in the Highland Park Plant of the Ford Motor Company he had access to the plant. He had charge of it from four plm. to twelve. He had sixty men under him, who were supposed to watch the property in three shifts. I took his place when he was fired because of graft. In the position which Scotty Gow had he was able to obtain babbitt, which is used instead of bronze in bushing, virgin tin, lead and copper.

"The possible connection is that Scotty Gow was connected with the Purple Gang, because the Gang could dispose of this property, and it is possible that Scotty Gow obtained some of this property and had it disposed of by the Purple Gang.

"Gow put a man on each crib to watch it, that is cribs of babbitt, virgin tin and copper, which was in ingots of 100 pounds each. The man that is put on that crib to watch it is a favored man, as it is an easy job. Gow calls him off, and tells him to go on a beat or come to the office. While he is away from the crib, that gives Gow time to take a truck over and load it, or have it loaded. These trucks invariably go out of the Oakland Street gate. The trucks belong to the Ford Motor Company, with the tags taken off. These tags, which identify the trucks as Ford Motor Company vehicles, could be taken off by the garage man, or Gow could unscrew the tags himself. The truck would then take this merchandise down to one of the junk dealers that keep their big kettles hot waiting for it to come in.

"These trucks take these ingots, etc., to the junk dealers, and immediately when the load arrives there the junk dealer's smelting pot is ready, the merchandise is poured in, and melted immediately, in order to eliminate the marking "F.M.C." which initials are stamped on everything in the Ford Motor Company. The detectives on this beat are in on this deal.

"One Jacoby, possibly living on California Street, was in the Purple Gang. He is a heavy set, Jewish fellow.

"Joe Mocco, his brother and a third person whom I could locate right now at a blind pig, being an Italian or Sicilian, whose name I cannot remember, were all three called in by Chester La Marr, from Ecorse, which is a suburb of Detroit, and told that he, La Marr, wanted Jackie Nichols, who had been kidnapped, returned to his home. He was brought back right away.

In addition to the above information, Mr. Candler stated that previous to the death of Chester La Marr, the latter occupied

office space at the Ford Motor Company in the office of the official in charge of the so-called Secret Service Department of the Ford Motor Company. Incidentally, Candler stated that the name "Secret Service" was changed to the Service Department, at the time of the Ford-Sapiro suit, due to an article criticizing Ford, which was written by Arthur Brisbane. Candler believed that La Marr was at one time the head of the Purple Gang; at least they carried out his instructions. The ostensible reason for La Marr's occupying office space in the office of the head of the Service Department, was because La Marr furnished the Ford Motor Company with all the produce purchased by them and sold through their Commissaries. Candler believes, however, that the real reason for his being in that office was protection, this office being the safest place for him in Detroit.

To summarize this matter as nearly as possible, I would say that the alleged connection of Scotty Gow with the Purple Gang was by reason of his ability to dispose of misappropriated goods from the Ford Motor Company, through the Purple Gang.

Mr. Candler further informed me that he intended taking a road trip for his sausage company but that he would make arrangements with his wife at home to communicate with him immediately, should I desire to talk with him further.

If any additional information is obtained here I will immediately communicate it to you.

Attorney, Kiami, Florida, and advised that a person by the name of William Worthing, alias Bill Worthing, who was convicted some time ago in California for smuggling aliens into the United States via airplane, and who is himself a pilot by occupation, had been in Kiami, Florida, about six months ago, and while in a conversation with several people, and in the presence had made the statement that he thought that the Lindbergh baby would be a good child to kidnap. advised that he thought nothing more of the incident until lately when he decided that this information might be of some help in this case. And advised that Worthing also had a friend, who name heldid not remember, but whom he thought was now in Mexico, who was mixed advised that Worthing also had a friend, whose up in a Lil robbery in California a few years ago, and that he had given this information to Mr. E. G. Allen, Post Office Inspector, Miemi, Florida, who had a file on this case and would have the name of this friend of Worthing's. advised that he did not know much concerning the personal history of Forthing, but that he has ascertained that he has some connection with the "Purple Cang", and may be found in Detroit, Mich.

In this connection advised that he has been employed as an information the U. S. Customs Agency, Miami, Florida, and that he had given this information of the local customs agency in Miami, Florida, who advised him to see this Agent about this matter.

I discussed this case with Post Office Inspector E. G. Allen, Hiami, Florida who showed me his file with reference to one William Harold Morthen. It appears that on April 22, 1931, who is referred to as advised that one Richard Easterbrook was wanted in California in connection with a mail robbe: involving the wreck of a plane and the loss of some 350,000.00 in currency, sometime in the month of September, 1930. operates a Dude Ranch Hotel near Portales, New Mexico and who formerly operated a place known as the "Zulu Hut" in Los Angeles, California. Easterbrook was described as being thirty-three years of age, having dark hair and dark eyes, and supposed to have had one heel shot off. The information in Mr. Allen's file, furnished by advised that Easterbrook and Vorthing coursesponded together by means of a reversed alphabet cipher, and that some of the letters were addressed to a min by the name of Dell who operated a garage at Portales. New Mexico. This information secured by Ir. Was supposed to have come from a woman associate of Forthing's to whom he had detailed some of the information given him by Easterbrook.

It further appears that Post Office Inspector A. W. Deming of Denver, Colo., made an investigation at Portales, New Mexico. on or about June 5. 1931, but was unable to verify the information given by

appears from the report of Post Office Inspector Deming that this case was being investigated through the office of Inspector G. H. Austin of the San Francisco Division, and that the case was carried under the title: Walter Mainline, alias Richard Easterbrook, alias Dicke Easterline, alias Daver Harding, alias Jack Chort, et al. Mr. Allen advised that he had no further information in this case, and that the complete file was no doubt in the office of Mr. Austin at San Francisco, California.

Richard Easterbrook is the associate of Worthing referred to by and who is alleged to be somewhere in Mexico. He is said by to have been a member of the Marple Gang" of Detroit.

A check of the identification records at the local police force and at the Sheriff's Office, Miani, Florida, disclosed the record of one William Harold orthing who was arrested on August 5, 1931, on a charge of breaking and entering, and subsequently released on his own recognizance. Harry Keywell, #31293, was arrested in Detroit in September, 1921, on charges of murder and has been in jail continuously ever since. In January, 1922, he received a life sentence in connection with this charge since which time he has been confined in the Michigan State Penitentiary at Marquette.

Phillip Keywell, #27946, was sentenced sometime in 1930 to life imprisonment in the Michigan State Penitentiary on charges of murder.

Irving Milberg, #28547, has likewise been in jail since September, 1931, in connection with the sememurder for which Harry Keywell was sentenced to life imprisonment. Hilberg is likewise confined in the Michigan State Penitentiary.

Raymond Burnstein, £28545, is the third member of the Purple Gang doing a life sentence in connection with the murder involving Milberg and Keywell. Burnstein has likewise been confined in jail continuously since September, 1931.

With the exception of Tocco, all of the persons whose photographs are transmitted are known to be ring leaders of the Purple Geng, and with the exception of Harry Keywell, Fhillip Keywell, Irving Milberg and Raymond Burnstein, all of them are at large at this time.

Herry Fleisher is the only member of the above outfit who is at present wanted by Hichigan authorities.

Inspector Carmody advised that on March 23, 1932, he transmitted to Colonel H. N. Schwarzkopf, of Trenton, New Jersey, full information concerning the names, addresses and records of all known extortionists and kidnapers operating in the Detroit District. It is suggested that Mr. Schwarzkopf be contacted for this information inasmuch as Inspector Carmody stated that it would take sometime to re-assemble and again compile this information. Condon, we not having contected Condon for reason that we are not familiar with the situation as to the manner in which Condon is being handled at this time in connection with the investigation being conducted by the New Jersey State Police.







Leebove admits, that the first time he ever voted in this state was last November—for Gov. Comstock, who in turn calls him his dearest and most trusted friend on earth.

On the stand he freely admitted that he was Comstock's political angel, that he had finance! his camaign; gave, he said \$20,000.

paign; gave, he said \$20,000.

He says his residence is in Clare, Mich. His name does not appear in the State Gazetteer. He bought a home there last fall. But he has a residence and a law office in New York,

As a New York lawyer he has been the attorney for some of the most notorious criminals in the his-tory of New York's underworld, One of his clients was Arnold Rothstein, of his chemis was Arriou Rothstein, a gangster so powerful that he was beyond the law and only met his punishment when rival gangsters slaughtered him through a woman

Leebove is known to have been an oil promoter in Texas and Okiahoma, before and during his career as a lawyer for gangsters and pro-fessional bondsmen in New York. He came to Michigan recently for the purpose of promoting oil wells.

His Club Thrice Raided

Among his other activities he was president of a Democratic club in New York which was raided three times by the police as a gambling joint. He succeeded in having the police enjoined from molesting his

Somewhere in his activities, whether in oil or law or gambling, whether in oil or law or gambling, he made the acquaintance of Mr. Comstock, who enjoys convivial companionships and is not averse to a turn at the wheel.

He says he financed "Bill" Comstock because he loves him and that his interest is purely altruistic.

Comstock in return made him his special prison investigator because he has absolute faith in his sincer-

ity and his integrity.

The New York lawyer and oil well promoter and the genial and happy-go-lucky Governor have become the Damon and Pythias of Michigan politics.

And so folks are asking louder than ever: WHO IS THIS MAN LEEROVE?

Out of Yew York comes the follower.

NEW YORK, June 15-Isalah Leebove's practice has been almost entirely with racketeers and gun-men in New York and he did a great deal of work for Arnold Rothstein, who was murdered in the Park Central Hotel in November,

Leebove was born in Pittsburgh, Nov. 27, 1894. His right name is supposed to be Isador Leebove. He graduated from Cumberland University, Lebanon, Tenn., with the degree of bachelor of law, and went to Texas, where he practiced law. Later he practiced in Oklahoma, and then moved on to New York.

He arrived here with an apparently unlimited supply of money, popularly said to have been made in Oklahoma oil deals. His name was soon prominently associated with those of underworld characteristics. acters.

Called 'Gangsters' Mouthpiece

Soon he became known as the "mouthpiece" of racketeers and gangsters. So strong was he that many held him to be the successor of the late William Fallon, known in his time as the greatest "mouthpiece" New York crooks had ever had.

Leebove went everywhere with Rothstein and was among the

regular patrons of Lindy's Restaurant, from which Rothstein called by telephone to his suite in the Park Central before he was shot. Not long before Rothstein was killed, he and Leebove had an argument.

Apparently he made a great amount of money out of friendamount of money out of friendship with Rothstein, receiving a \$40,000 fee from a New York union to defend two men accused of murder in a strike which was financed with a loan by Rothstein.

Leebove was friendly with Rothstein are received.

stein's associates and once he won \$60,000 in a dice game with Nick-the Greek, perhaps Broadway's best known gambler. After Rothstein's death, Leebove was the law-yer for Nick, Alvin C. Thomas, Sidney Stajer and Jimmy Meehan, who were held for a time as ma-terial witnesses. Meehan ran the famous revolving poker game which is supposed to have been the cause of Rothstein's killing.

Rushed to Aid of 'Legs'

Always anxious to see his name in the newspapers, Leebove was ready to defend any gangster in difficulties. When "Legs" Diamond was wounded near his home in Acra, Green County, Leebove raced up from New York and announced that he was Diamond's attorney, although Diamond had not asked for one. He had, however, represented Diamond before and asso,

on occasion, Owney Madden.
The information here is that Leebove is working with Frederick Kaplan, another New York lawyer, now in Detroit, who is seeking to obtain pardons from the Governor.

Kaplan is said to have occupied offices with Leebove at 521 Fifth Ave. In the latest telephone book Ave. In the latest telephone book and City Directory, Leebove still lists that address as his office.

Kaplan was reported as having been retained by Rothstein to de-fend Charles Fawcett, who was accused of holding up a coffee pot in the Bronx. Magistrate Albert Vi-tale dismissed the charge, although two persons had identified Fawcett as the robber. This was one of the charges that led to Vitale's removal by the Appellate Division. Another was that he had borrowed \$20,000 from Rothstein.

In Mysterious Accident

Five or six years ago, Leebove was attorney for two men held in Connecticut for a crime in New York. He went up to Connecticut with the two detectives assigned to bring back the men and on the return trip he is supposed to have run his car in a ditch, one of the de-tectives being injured seriously. One of the prisoners escaped. A detec-tive held on to the other.

The files show that in 1926 Lee-bove was involved in a hit-and-run accident at Newington, Conn. in which Mrs. Arthur L. Young was killed. He and his chauffeur, Rufus Wood, a Negro, were held in \$15,000 bail each on charges of reckless driving, manslaughter and evading responsibility after an accident. Leebove and the chauffeur had been arrested soon after the accident as they were riding through Meri-den. Leebove said he drove off be-cause witnesses shouted, "Lynch him.

Leebove was famous here for the lengths to which he would go in de-fense of clients wanted by the police. His dispute with Magistrate Hyman Bushel was characteristic of him.

The trouble with the Magistrate came durnig the hearing of a swindling charge against Dapper Dan Collins, confidence man, was charged with having fleeced an Egg Harbor man out of \$30,000 and the State of New Jersey wanted him. Magistrate Bushel ordered Collins held in jail without ball. Leebove argued against it and grew so arrogant that the Magistrate put him in the detention pen and kept him there for an hour.

A Threat and an Apology

When released, Leebove breathed fire and screamed vengeance through the newspapers, to the delight of the underworld. Later he quitely apologized.

In 1927, Leebove became a theatrical producer. He had a play "New York," and the management of the Broad Street Theater in Newark, N. J., tried to keep it out because of its reported salaciousness. Leebove won a court fight to have the theater carry out its contract. A few weeks later the play opened in New York. It turned out to be a modern version of "Nellie The Sewing Machine Girl" and didn't last long.

While New York was in an up-roar over the Lindbergh kidnaping, and prominent underworld characters were being quizzed daily, Lce-bove suddenly disappeared. He was heard from later in Michigan, where it was announced he was atwhere it was amounted the torney for Salvatore Spitale and Irving Bitz, Colonel Lindbergh's go-betweens in the fruitless endeavors which he made to contact the kidnapers of his child.

Lechove's last home address in New York was 28 E. Tenth St. It is a fashionable house. The superintendent there said that Leebove had moved out about two months ago, leaving no forwarding address. He also said that Lebove had not occupied the apartment for some time before he moved.

"I did not. The entire episode is just a silly situation. I might say further that I don't think your committee is honest or conscien-tious in asking those questions." Leebove was asked about the road

Leebove was asked about the road built in front of his home in Clare. "I wonder where Smith (Councilman Smith) thought I ought to

live, in a swamp or in the Ever-glades? I have never petitioned for that road, never talked to anyone about it nor used any influence in obtaining it. That is a part of what is known as the Taft Highway, and is a part of the State pro-gram," he replied.

ram," he replied, Senator Derham, lacking names and circumstances which Leebove later supplied, had introduced the subject of the "springing of the Purple gangsters and insisted that Leebove was reported to have appealed to Warden Corgan to per-

mit a private interview between Kaplan and his inmate clients.

Derham insisted that corroboratory evidence would be produced by Corgan and by Edward Frensdorf, whom he stated had made a similar appeal over the long-dis-tance telephone. Both have been Calls Charge Too Broad

Derham said that he thought the ntimation that Leebove "had taken over the State Government" was too broad, but did think that he exercised considerable influence.

The Leebove survey had disrupted

the morale of prison personnel, Derham testified.

Derham, a lawyer, said that the Governor has no authority to send a private citizen as an unofficial

emissary to survey prisons.

"Here is a man who has defended the second most notorious gangster in the United States, and prison employees paraded before him for salary adjustments.

"Any attorney who defends and represents a client of the type of Legs Diamond is entitled to censure and is not a good citizen."

Derham sponsored the Senate

resolution requesting a grand jury, directed by Supreme Court Justice Howard Weist, to inquire into lobbying and bribe charges.

Metzger Takes Stand

Samuel T. Metzger, agricultural commissioner, was certain that Lee-bove had not influenced to the bove had not influenced to the slightest degree the appointments in his department.

He was equally certain that no collections that might be regarded as compulsory Democratic Party "tribute" are permitted. Voluntary

as compulsory Democratic Party "tribute" are permitted. Voluntary contributions are acceptable, he said, explaining that all appointments are on recommendation of the Democratic State organization. Metzger admitted that he had more than a passing interest in the pending pari-mutual racing legislation, but explained that it was actuated by his desire to see the State reap the revenue available from this direction. The socalled Metzger bill, introduced in the Senate by Senator Claude B. Root, was in fact brought to Lan-Root, was in fact brought to Lan-sing by a man named Dowling, of Owosso, Metzger said.

\$390,000 Is Scented

Proffers of contracts were available which would net Michigan \$6,500 a day for 60 days of racing this season and 100 days next season at the State Fairgrounds in Detroit, Metzger said. He told the Committee that only one of these offers was in writing, but that the others had been made orally by responsible persons. He said that he knew of no Lecbove interest in racing. Metzger was hazy on the details of the sale of a car of potatoes to Kalamazoo State Hospital by the Leonard, Cross & Riley commission house, of Greenville, headed by his son Thomas. He agreed that Kalamazoo producers undoubtedly could supply the hospital cheaper than the Greenville concern, but he doubted whether there were sufficient potatoes available for immediate delivery in the Kalamazoo vicinity. He denied any personal connection with this firm.

With a Friday adjournment limiting the time of the hearing, a night

session was ordered to hear John L. Lovett, of the Michigan Manufacturers Association; Edward N. Frensdorf and others. The prison wardens are expected Friday from Marquette and Jackson.

Search has failed to disclose the whereabouts of Constantine A. (Teeny) Daniels, wanted for questioning in connection with Senator Edward B. McKenna's "fixing-for-life" bribe charges, and it is doubt-ful whether he will be available be-

fore the adjournment.

Toy Denies Kaplan Charge That Conviction Was Unfair

Prosecutor Toy read the charge which Leebove said that Kaplan made against him.

"These men were convicted before Judge Van Zile," he declared.

"They had two eminently capable trial lawyers to defend them, Rodney Baxter and Edward Kennedy.



"After their conviction they ap-pealed, and the Supreme Court of the State of Michigan held that they had been given a fair trial and sustained Judge Van Zije.



If it is the privilege of a private citizen, may I call to your attention for investigation a condition which I am satisfied exists in the State of Michigan, the correction of which warrants federal assistance.

I am addressing this request to you because of recent statements in the press relating the determination of the <u>federal government</u> to stamp out politico-gangster government. I am not directing the message to Senators Couzens or Vandenberg because I do not wish it to carry any political implications.

May I state first, as evidence of good faith, that I am ready to assist you in any manner within my power. Unfortunatly I have no evidence in support of my conviction of wrong doing but I feel that it lies within your power to unearth such evidence and bring it to light, or if I am in error, reassure me along with many other citizens of Michigan that there is no ground for my suspicion.

I am convinced that Governor Comstock and a My. Isaiah Leebove are in the business of delivering prisoners from jail for a price. I will enumerate from memory, and in the order of their occurence approximately, events reported in the press leading to my stated conviction; 1. Governor Comstock inaugurated. 2. Arthur Mich (probably most wealthy Michigan prisoner released).

3. Isaiah Leebove (said to be former N. Y. gangster lawyer) revealed as sole contributor to Comstock campaign fund.

4. Many other prisoners released (over objection of trial judges in many cases. 5. Mr. Leebove appointed by Governor to make private survey of all Michigan prisons. 6. In course of his investigation Leebove

attempts to force Warden Corgan of Marquette Prison to permit private interview by attorney with three Purple rengeters (Bernstein, et al). Attorney was Fred Dr. Kaplan of New York, said to have been employed in New York office by Mr. Leebove. 7. Warden Corgan discharged along with wardens of other prisons. 8. New trial petitioned for the three Purple Gangsters in Detroit by Attorney Kaplan. New evidence revealed as perjured and forged by Prosecuting Attorney Toy. 9. Recall petitions out for Governor's recall because of his connection with Leebove. This effort quickly dropped. Probably because it was in weak hands with professional leadership. At any rate the recall would be an unsatisfactory and drawn out method of correcting the situation. 10. Resignation of the three members of the Recorders Court Jury Commission in Detroit requested and demanded by the Governor. Splendid record of the commission attested to by local judges. 11. Hearing on petition for new trial mentioned above, being delayed by Kaplan in every way possible. Apparently waiting for new jury commission to hand pick his jury if he is able to get new trial for gangsters.

No doubt you have investigators in the field who are familiar with the situation I have outlined and who are capable of determining if the conclusions I draw are correct.

I notice that October 6th. is the date set for the Senate Committee inquiry into Detroit rackets. In my opinion the mayor, police commissioner and Prosecutor Toy in particular are doing their utmost to combat gangsters and racketeers. Their efforts will be of little avail if the chief executive of the state is aiding or operating a racket, and to accomplish his end is willing to go so far as to tamper with the jury system and prison administration.

In fairness to you I assure you that none of the dismissed officials are friends of mine or known to me. My sole purpose in asking your aid is to see the wrong corrected if my suspicion is well founded, or to be satisfied through your investigation that I have misjudged the accused.







Sylvan Pernstein stated he was born in New York City, March 8, 1907; that he attended public school 83, and De Witt Clinton High School, but did not graduate. He worked as an errand boy for Harry Hess & Co., novelty importers, for two years and quit of his own accord. He then worked for B. Edmond & David Co., silk house, as an examiner in the tie goods department for about one year. He then worked for Powell and Campbell Shoe House, 122 Duane Street, New York, as a clerk in the stock shoes department for about a year. He worked for Barnett & Effros Dress House as a shipping clerk for packer for two years. He worked for the United States Post Office from 1926 to 1929 at station 805 West 69th St. as a clerk. He resigned from the Post Office and went to Chicago, where he was employed as a guard for racketeers in the bootlegging and other rackets. He was employed in the Al Capone gang for a company while. He became acquainted with Teddy Newbury, Sammy Hunt, Mexy Isen, Johnny Weasel, Freddy Drecker, and worked with them in the dope recket and gambling for about two years. He left Chicago and went to Detroit, where he worked for "Honey Boy" Joe Miller in the policy racket, working numbers. This was in 1931. He also became acquainted and worked with Harry Flasher, Issy Bernstein, Joey Bernstein, (no relation) Charlie Lighter, and Henry Schol in the bootlegging and hand-book rackets. He stated that these men are still engaged in rackets in Detroit and have a brewery and alcohol still there.

In the Fall of 1935, he came back to New York and is now not working anywhere, but associating with gamblers and underworld characters. He stated he is acquainted with various "big shot" racketeers in New York in the Bugs-Meyer gang. He mentioned the names of Lipkey and Gurrah. He stated these gangs are engaged in the Union racket, slugging, dope and wanatch rackets. He stated he knows Dutch Goldberg. He stated that Albert Silvers, decessed, and Dr. Erwin R. Silvers, who were convicted in the Verne-Miller case, in connection with the Kansas City Massacre, were well known to him. In enswer to inquiries regarding various important Division cases, such as the Lindbergh kidnaping case, the Bremer kidnaping case, and the Kansas City massacre case, he could give no detailed information of value to the Division. He could give no information concerning the whereabouts of John Dillinger. He stated, however, that were he employed by the Division, he has avenues of information through his former connections in the various cities

Icebreaker KRASSIN, while en route through the Panama Canal about 15 or 16 April, will drop off a number of extreme radicals who are to take active part in communistic activities in the vicinity of the Canal Zone. It is understood that these communists are being/placed in the Canal Zone not only to spread propagamia, but to create acts of violence that may endanger the safety of the Canal.

The State Department, the War Department, the Commandant, Fifteenth Naval District, and the Commander Special Service Squadron have been advised of the above information.
